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Engaging Visitors with Podcasts By Bradley Block, Chief of Interpretation Jewel Cave National Monument

Podcasts are no longer only associated with audio files, such as books and reference materials. Multiple public land agencies, historic sites, and zoos/aquariums are creating videos that include interpretive narration and even animation. Whether they are called podcasts, videocasts, or interpretive vignettes, these sorts of productions offer additional opportunities to engage with the public.



Jewel Cave National Monument in the Black Hills of South Dakota continues with its development of video productions for online visitor engagement. With the completion of a new park film, staff decided to use the additional footage to create twelve interpretive podcasts. Each podcast is about three to five minutes in length and complements thematic areas for both the surface and subsurface resources. Most important, the thematic areas offer answers to common visitor questions throughout the year, such as "Which cave tour is best for a family?" and "Is the cave home to bats?"

Although originally planned for release once each month, COVID-19 created an opportunity to educate and creatively interact with visitors through social media videos. Starting in mid-March, the interpretive podcasts were uploaded to the [monument's website](#). Since then, the various podcasts have been shared on the monument's Facebook Page, with links back to the website for additional titles. To accommodate all audiences, each podcast is captioned and provides audio description to

complement 508 compliance for federal agencies.

A special thanks to the NPS Harper's Ferry Center for assistance with the initial Scope of Work, as well as multiple local park units with editorial suggestions, feedback, and shared resources. As a small park site, the monument is happy to share these additional productions for even greater visitor awareness. Best of all, the productions can be viewed from anywhere in the world and at any time on the website. This has already proven to be very beneficial for student reports and visitor inquiries, as well as accommodating "missed" school field trips this past spring.
